

Why use pictures?

- They are usually related to 'real life'
- They can be fun and entertaining
- They can often encourage creativity
- They can be found easily in books, magazines and on the Internet
- A picture is worth a thousand words

What can you cover using pictures?

- prepositions of place
- Present Continuous
- speculation (and modal verbs of probability)
- vocabulary (appearance and personality, rooms and furniture, animals, toys and much more...)

Activity 1: Kahoot revision

- Students use their phones to connect to Kahoot.it, they enter the PIN and their nicknames
- They choose the correct descriptions

▲ A cat is lying under a chair.

- ▲ The child is between the parents.
- The child is behind the parents.

The child is opposite of the parents.

The child is in front of the parents.

- ▲ The woman is behind the man.
- The woman is behind the child.
- The man is in front of the woman.
- The child is next to the woman.

The women is opposite the men.

◆ The woman is opposite a men.

The woman is opposite the men.

■ The women is opposite a men.

Answers

There is two people in the picture.

There is two peoples in the picture.

There are two people in the picture.

There are two peoples in the picture.

Activity 2: Describe a photograph

- Make groups of 4 to 5 people
- Everyone will get one picture that they can't show to anyone else
- Everyone will take turns describing the photograph they were given and the person to their right will need to identify it among 10 different ones
- Identify all pictures as quickly as possible





















Variations of this activity

- Write down the description before reading it
- Group work each student writes down a description of one photograph and then the other students from the group need to identify it
- Group work only one student is in charge of identifying the pictures as they are being described – competing how fast each group can complete the task
- Students can describe only people (their appearance) and then they need to identify the person described
- Students can describe and identify rooms

Activity 3: Describe a photograph

 One person (or a group) gets a picture and another person (or a group) needs to recreate the photograph based only on the description they are given











Variations of this activity

- Students write down the descriptions individually or as a group, then they read the instructions to the "actors"
- One student from the class gives one instruction, then another one and so on...

Activity 4: Spot the differences

 In pairs find the differences between pictures without looking at each other's pictures – you can only describe your picture or ask and answer questions

Variations of this activity

- One question one answer
- Only yes/no questions
- One sentence by one student one sentence by the other
- One student talks, the other listens
- Set a time limit and check how many differences each group was able to find

Activity 5: Speculate

 Write down a sentence about this picture using "must", "can", "may", "might", "can't"



Variation of this activity

 Write down a sentence about this photograph using "must have", "could have", "may have", "might have", "can't have"



Activity 6: A story for homework

Write a short story based on one of these photographs
